14th Sunday after Pentecost/Proper 17

This order of worship and its liturgical elements may be used in any time of worship that seeks to respond to the epidemic of gun violence.

GATHERING

CALL TO WORSHIP

Have three candles prepared for lighting during the Call to Worship

Voice 1: We gather this day in lament, in commitment and in hope, remembering and honoring the lives of countless children of God, slaughtered in ____ (name communities impacted by gun violence). They gathered in daily routine for joy, for study, for play, for errands, for praise and in community, and their lives were ended by acts of violence and hate. Voice 2: We light these candles to honor their lives; the thousands more-- families, neighbors and friends-- whose lives also have been shattered by violence and loss; and to acknowledge in confession and sorrow the loss of life still to come, as public violence in our nation continues unchecked. Voice 3: This is the time of ending, and the time of beginning again. We light this candle to honor victims, surround survivors with love, and commit ourselves to a vision of neighborhoods and nations shaped by justice, dignity and peace. Light 1st candle Voice 4: This is the season for remembering, and for being remembered by God We light this candle for those who are too many to name, whose lives have been ended or shattered by hatred and gun violence. Light 2nd candle All:

This is the season for being, and for being known in God's image.

We light this candle to commit ourselves to work for a world free from violence and

hate.

Let us worship God. Light 3rd candle

CALL TO CONFESSION THE CONFESSION OF 1967

To be reconciled to God is to be sent into the world as God's reconciling community. This community, the church universal, is entrusted with God's message of reconciliation and shares God's labor of healing the enmities which separate people from God and from each other. Christ has called the church to this mission and given it the gift of the Holy Spirit.

The life, death, resurrection, and promised coming of Jesus Christ has set the pattern for the church's mission. His human life involves the church in the common life of all people. His service to humankind commits the church to work for every form of human well-being. His suffering makes the church sensitive to all human suffering so that it sees the face of Christ in the faces of persons in every kind of need. His crucifixion discloses to the church God's judgment on the inhumanity that marks human relations, and the awful consequences of the church's own complicity in injustice. In the power of the risen Christ and the hope of his coming, the church sees the promise of God's renewal of human life in society and of God's victory over all wrong.

(Confession of 1967 9.31-32)

PRAYER ON CONFESSION (unison)

God of peace, Holy One of justice, we confess to you this day that we are hurting, angry and confused. In a world of hurt and violence, have you abandoned us? Our hearts are broken with grief and loss; our spirits are weary with our failure to end the unrelenting scourge of gun violence. We see the faces, we remember the stories, we recall how many times we have gathered to march, to pray, to lift our voices in advocacy, to say, "never again!" We are tired, we are weighed down by our failure to change ourselves or transform our nation, we need your mercy, and the cleansing power of your justice. Forgive our inaction and our lack of belief in your kindom. *Strengthen the weak hands and make firm the feeble knees.* Renew our hope, help us toward each other, and draw us ever toward your love and justice. In the name of Jesus the Christ, we pray. Amen.

PRACTICING

AFFIRMATION OF FAITH THE CONFESSION OF BELHAR

One: We believe in one God, Father Son and Holy Spirit, who gathers, protects and nourishes the Church from the beginning of the world to the end.

All: The Church is holy; the Church is universal; it is the fellowship of God's children, called together from the whole of humanity to proclaim God's wonderful deeds.

One: We believe that the reconciling work of Christ gives birth to a uniting Church, because Church unity is a gift from God and a goal we need to strive for.

All: The unity of the Church must become visible so that the people around us can see how separation and hatred are overcome in Christ.

One: We believe that genuine faith in Jesus Christ is the only condition for membership in this Christian Church.

All: We praise God that race, class, gender, or culture does not determine who belongs to this Church.

One: We believe that God has entrusted to the Church the message of reconciliation;

and that the Church is called to proclaim and embody this reconciliation; to be peacemakers; and to believe and to witness that God conquers all powers of sin and death, of hate, bitterness and enmity, through his life-giving Word and Spirit.

All: We praise God that the gospel does not separate people on the basis of race, gender, class, or culture, but is the power of reconciliation in Christ.

One: We believe that God wants to bring about true justice and lasting peace on earth; we believe that God is, in a special sense, the God of the suffering, the poor and the downtrodden.

All: We praise God who gives justice to the oppressed and bread to the hungry; who sets captives free and makes the blind to see; who protects strangers, orphans and widows. and obstructs the plans of the wicked.

One: We believe that the Church belongs to God and that it should stand where God stands: against injustice and with those who are wronged

All: We commit ourselves to reject all forms of injustice in ourselves and amongst us; and to struggle against all forms of injustice and every teaching that allows injustices to flourish.

One: We are called to confess and to do all this in obedience to Jesus Christ, our only Lord, even if authorities or laws oppose this, even if punishment and suffering may be the consequence.

All: Jesus is Lord! We will follow Him!

To the one God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit,
be honour and glory for ever and ever.

Be with us and bless us as we are renewed by your spirit to find new alternatives to violence, especially in our roles as Christian peacemakers. May we be changed forever by your vision of peace. Through Christ, the Prince of Peace who taught us to say when we pray, *Our Father (Creator)...*

SENDING

CHARGE

One: At the prayer vigil for those murdered in San Bernardino, Bishop Barnes, who grew up in East Los Angeles, said "amen" would be repeated many times during the evening. "We will nod our heads and grieve with the words that are shared. But what comes after the amen? What will we do in God's name and in prayer after we leave this church?" he asked. "Our 'amen' is our willingness to have God lead us on to guide our vision and our actions. Let us find God calling us to be better neighbors, to be better at loving each other, to be committed workers for justice and peace, to be strong witnesses to God's presence and God's mercy in our home, our community and the world. Let our 'amen' be a call to merciful discipleship in the name of our Lord."
