

### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

The campus of the University of Tennessee, Knoxville, is the location for most Big Tent events. See page 74 for a campus map, and the schedule, starting on page 12, for locations.

**The Big Tent Information Center** is located in the lower level of the Presidential Court Cafeteria. It will be staffed daily around meal times by volunteers from East Tennessee Presbytery, who will provide information on and assistance with:

- Big Tent questions and concerns
- Directions and maps on area services, restaurants, shops, and attractions
- Transportation
- · Accessibility and services for attendees with disabilities
- · Lost and found

Volunteers (wearing blue vests) will be stationed in other key locations to provide directions and assistance.

#### WORSHIP AND BIBLE STUDY

We will gather for worship and inspiration several times as the Big Tent community:

- Opening worship on Thursday at 4:00 p.m., in the Cox Auditorium in the Alumni Memorial Hall on the UT campus. This service will include the celebration of the Lord's Supper. The preacher is Jana Childers, professor of Homiletics and Speech-Communication, San Francisco Theological Seminary.
- Bible Study led by Kang Yup Na, Associate Professor in Religion, History, Philosophy, and Classics, Westminster College. The theme is "The Lost and Found of Missional Living," focusing on Luke 15. It will be offered on Thursday evening (7:00 p.m.) and Saturday morning (8:30 a.m.), both in Cox Auditorium.
- Morning worship on Friday at 8:30 a.m., in the Cox Auditorium. The preacher is Laurene Chan, Director of Youth Ministries, Cameron House, San Francisco.
- Closing Worship on Saturday at 4:00 p.m., in the Cox Auditorium.
   The preacher is Paul Roberts, President, Johnson C. Smith Theological Seminary.

Music for the worship services is coordinated by Hugh Donnelly, Guildwood Presbyterian Church, Scarborough, Ontario, Canada, who is joined by Marissa Galván-Valle, Associate for Hispanic Resources and Relationships and Sera Chung, Associate for Gender and Racial Justice at the Presbyterian Mission Agency. The organist is Jason Overall, canon preceptor and organist/choirmaster, St. John's Episcopal Cathedral, Knoxville.

An offering will be collected at the opening worship service, to be shared between support for Presbyterian mission co-workers around the world and the Presbyterian Campus Ministries supported by the Presbytery of East Tennessee. Thank you for supporting these ministries financially and in your prayers.

### **WORKSHOPS AND NETWORKING OPPORTUNITIES**

Three featured workshops are offered following worship on Friday morning:

- Ministries of Advocacy and Renewal, led by Scott Weimer, Pastor, North Avenue Presbyterian Church, Atlanta.
- Ministries for Poverty and Hunger, led by Sister Simone Campbell (Sisters of Social Service), Executive Director of NETWORK, and Author of A Nun on the Bus: How All of Us Can Create Hope, Change, and Community.
- Ministries Equipping Leaders for Discipleship and Evangelism, led by Rodger Nishioka, Associate Professor of Christian Education, Columbia Theological Seminary.

On Friday afternoon and Saturday, there are seven sessions of Big Tent workshops with as many as eighteen offerings in each session. These are sponsored by ministries of the PC(USA) agencies and related Presbyterian organizations, and are excellent opportunities to learn more about these topics and engage with leaders and other participants. See the Schedule of Events in this Program for more information.

During these Big Tent workshop sessions on Friday afternoon and Saturday, some classrooms on the first floor of the Humanities and Social Sciences building (HSS) are designated as Networking Rooms, to provide a more relaxed, relational opportunity to talk with representatives from some of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) ministries and with other Big Tent participants. Hosts include the Committee on Theological Education (COTE), the Office of the General Assembly's Mid Council Ministries, Presbyterian Foundation, the Presbyterian Investment and Loan Program, Special Offerings, World Mission

and the Advisory Committee on Social Witness Policy. The schedule for these opportunities will be posted on the first floor of the HSS building.

#### **EXHIBIT TENTS**

Be sure to visit the Big Tent Exhibit tents, located in the middle of Presidential Courtyard, which can be found between the cafeteria and the campus housing. This is an excellent way to learn more about the mission and witness of the PC(USA) through the work of the six agencies, and also how to become more involved.

The displays of the six agencies are open and staffed:

and 8:30 to 9:30 p.m.

### THE PC(USA) STORE

The PC(USA) offers a central online store where you can find all PC(USA)-produced books, curriculum, and resources in one place. It offers a comprehensive selection of PC(USA) resources that provides the information and materials necessary to support new and existing congregations, leaders, study groups, and individuals to forge a deeper understanding of Presbyterian beliefs and doctrines. The PC(USA) Store is maintained by the Presbyterian Publishing Corporation, the publishing house of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), Congregational Ministries Publishing, and other agency partners.

The PC(USA) Store will have a physical presence at Big Tent, in Room 102, on the second floor of the Humanities and Social Sciences Building (HSS). It will be open and staffed:

Thursday: 3:00–6:00 p.m. (closed during opening worship)

Friday: 8:00 a.m.–6:00 p.m. (closed during morning worship)

Saturday: 8:00 a.m.—4:00 p.m.

#### **MEALS AND DINING**

The Big Tent experience includes opportunities to dine and network with other attendees throughout Big Tent.

Big Tent registration (for commuters and those staying on campus) includes meals in the Presidential Court cafeteria. Big Tent meals begin with dinner on Thursday, July 30. Weather permitting, dinner on Friday will be on the lawn outside the Humanities and Social Sciences building (location of the Friday and Saturday workshops).

On Saturday evening, participants are on their own for dinner. Information on restaurants near the campus and in downtown Knoxville is available at the Big Tent Information Center.

#### CHILDREN AND YOUTH PROGRAMS

As part of the Big Tent community, children and youth participate in worship and shared meals. During most other sessions, children and youth will participate in the excellent programming coordinated by the staff of East Tennessee Presbytery's John Knox Center and Second Presbyterian Church, Knoxville. #### YOUNG ADULTS AT BIG TENT

Big Tent is a gathering for all Presbyterians—and that includes young adults. In the midst of the worship, workshops, meals, gatherings, and recreation, there are opportunities for those aged 19–30ish.

On Thursday and Friday evenings, join other young adults for Young Adult Hospitality Nights at the UT UKIRK Center at 1831 Melrose Avenue on the UT campus. Drop by, meet new people, and catch up with friends—free food provided! See the Schedule of Events in this Program for more information.

# Other Things We Need to Know.... ACCESSIBILITY

The UT facilities are accessible. However, access to the cafeteria for those unable to use the stairs is by the freight elevator located in the kitchen; volunteers will provide assistance.

For those unable to walk the distances between the Presidential Court and the other UT facilities used for Big Tent meetings, transportation is available using UT buses and Big Tent golf carts.

Persons with vision, hearing, mobility impairment, or other special needs will find information about various kinds of assistance and accessibility at the Information Center in the lower level of the Presidential Court cafeteria.

### Awareness of People with Disabilities

Throughout our time together, we ask that you pay close attention to those around you who may need assistance. In particular:

- Please be aware of those around you, particularly when walking in a crowd. Persons using walkers or canes, or who are unsteady on their feet, are in jeopardy when in large, pushing crowds. If you notice such an individual, you could walk behind them at a slower pace to protect them.
- Please be aware of those behind you when opening a door. Stay an extra moment when possible to hold the door open for those who might need the assistance.
- If you notice that someone might need assistance, please ask rather than assuming or physically intervening. Occasions where assistance might be appreciated include buffet lines and when opening heavy doors.
- Please do not pet or talk with service animals (guide dogs) while they are working; be sensitive to the need to take a service animal for an outdoor break, offering assistance if appropriate.
- When possible, please be seated toward the center of long rows of chairs.
   This allows those with mobility difficulties greater ease in being seated.
- Please use a handicap stall in bathrooms only when you recognize that there is no one in line who can use only that stall.
- Please remember that some individuals have fragrance and chemical sensitivities and refrain from wearing heavy perfume, after-shave lotions, scented deodorants and lotions to meetings and group meals.

#### RECREATION AND FITNESS

Big Tent registration fees include access to the recreational and fitness facilities at the Tennessee Recreational Center (TRECS), located near the Presidential Court. Facilities include four basketball courts, a 1/7th mile indoor circular track, outdoor pool, more than 80 pieces of cardiovascular machines, and more than 100 strength training stations. Day-use lockers are available in locker rooms and on the track level.

Present your Big Tent conference badge for access.

On Friday and Saturday mornings, from 6:00–700 a.m., Bryce Wiebe, manager of the Office of Special Offerings, PMA, will lead a morning devotional and workout. Meet Bryce at 6:00 a.m. at the TRECs check in desk (just inside the entrance) to participate.

#### **OTHER CAMPUS OPPORTUNITIES**

Big Tent participants are welcome to visit UT's McClung Museum of Natural History and Culture, located on campus at 1327 Circle Park Drive. Admission to the permanent and special exhibitions is free, and the museum and museum store are open 9:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m., Monday through Saturday, with special evening hours on Friday for Big Tent attendees.

#### **TRANSPORTATION**

## Around the UT campus

UT vehicles and Big Tent golf carts are providing transportation between the Presidential Court and other UT facilities where Big Tent gathering will be held.

#### Around town

The Big Tent Information Center in the Presidential Court cafeteria building can provide information about transportation to area attractions.

## Airport transportation

Taxi fare is approximately \$25 between the airport and the campus.

#### **EMERGENCY PROCEDURES**

The UT Police Department is dedicated to providing a safe campus, using a combination of police patrol, community service officers, and a comprehensive crime prevention program.

The University of Tennessee has taken a number of initiatives to promote a safer campus area, and a comprehensive Emergency Management Plan that encompasses planning for incidents such as a pandemic outbreak, criminal activity, or a natural disaster.

Please visit **safety.utk.edu** for more information on emergency preparedness and occupational safety.

Wherever you are, be aware of the exit(s) in any room, and the closest exit to the outdoors. Know evacuations routes and where to meet. When you are in a building, know where the stairwells are and look for the Emergency Posters indicating shelter locations and assembly areas. It is always a good idea to check in with someone if you are involved in an emergency so they don't tie up resources or come to the incident scene trying to find out if you are safe.

#### **Summoning Assistance:**

It is generally advisable for facility staff to be the ones to contact the fire department, EMTs, ambulance, police, or other emergency response personnel. They are best able to respond and provide directions to the emergency location.

If you need assistance or discover a fire, someone needing medical attention, or any other emergency situation, alert UT staff (865-974-3111), or alert the Big Tent Information Center.

## **Safety and Security Procedures**

As in any city and facility, exercise caution while attending Big Tent activities and enjoying Knoxville. Do not wear your name badge off campus. Walk in groups at night; stay on the main streets, and avoid alleys. Safeguard your wallet and do not carry large sums of money. Lock your vehicle when parked and never leave valuables visible in a parked car. Know the location of blue light phones on campus. More than 100 phones are placed in various locations throughout campus, **utk.edu/maps**.

Do not leave valuables unattended in any UT meeting room or public area. Report any security incidents immediately to the hotel operator.

Lock your door whenever you are in your UT suite or hotel room. Do not open your door to strangers. Do not leave cash and valuables where they will be a temptation to a thief. Safeguard your room key. Report any incidents immediately to UT staff or your hotel management.

#### **EVALUATIONS**

Please watch for this, and take the time to complete the survey. Your input is valued. Please also complete and return the evaluation forms that you receive for the individual partner conferences and workshops.

#### PHOTOGRAPHY AND MEDIA USE

The 2015 Big Tent brings together hundreds of participants from across the church. Photographers, reporters, videographers, historians, and many others will be capturing cherished moments at this gathering of the church. By being a part of this event, you may find your image, voice, or quotes used in reporting or promotion. The Open Meeting Policy of the PC(USA) calls on us to conduct our ministries in this spirit of openness, trust, and public scrutiny. By attending and participating, you give Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), A Corporation, its affiliated institutions, related entities, and ecumenical partners permission to use your image, voice, feedback, and quotes on a perpetual, worldwide, irrevocable basis in any and all media including, but not limited to, websites, print, cable, and broadcast media without submission or resubmission to you for approval. You understand that third parties accessing web pages can download your image, voice, and quotes, and you release Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), A Corporation, its affiliated institutions, related entities, and ecumenical partners from any liability to you, your heirs, or your assigns in connection with or arising out of such downloading by third parties.

Using a camera, or tape recorder is permitted during conference sessions, provided that participants in the meeting are treated with courtesy and respect, the photographer does not obstruct the view of other participants, and camera flashes or other lights do not interfere with participants or proceedings.

During worship or other times of prayer, all participants and members of the press should be respectful of the sacred nature of the event. Photographs made with the use of existing lighting are permitted in these services if taken unobtrusively and without disrupting either the service itself or individual worshipers. Flash photography is not permitted.

We ask that those taking photographs or other images during Big Tent who use children as subjects assure that the child's identity is protected, or receive permission from the parent/guardian.

**Potluck Theology**—It's been said that "where two or three Asians are gathered, there will be food." Asian Presbyterians come with a richly varied mix of ethnicities, historical alliances and conflicts, languages, religious traditions, class distinctions, and, of course, cuisines. Yet there may be a few common roots from which we share certain values, strengthened by our place in the PC(USA) culture. Rev. Wendy Tajima will explore some of the history of Asians in the
