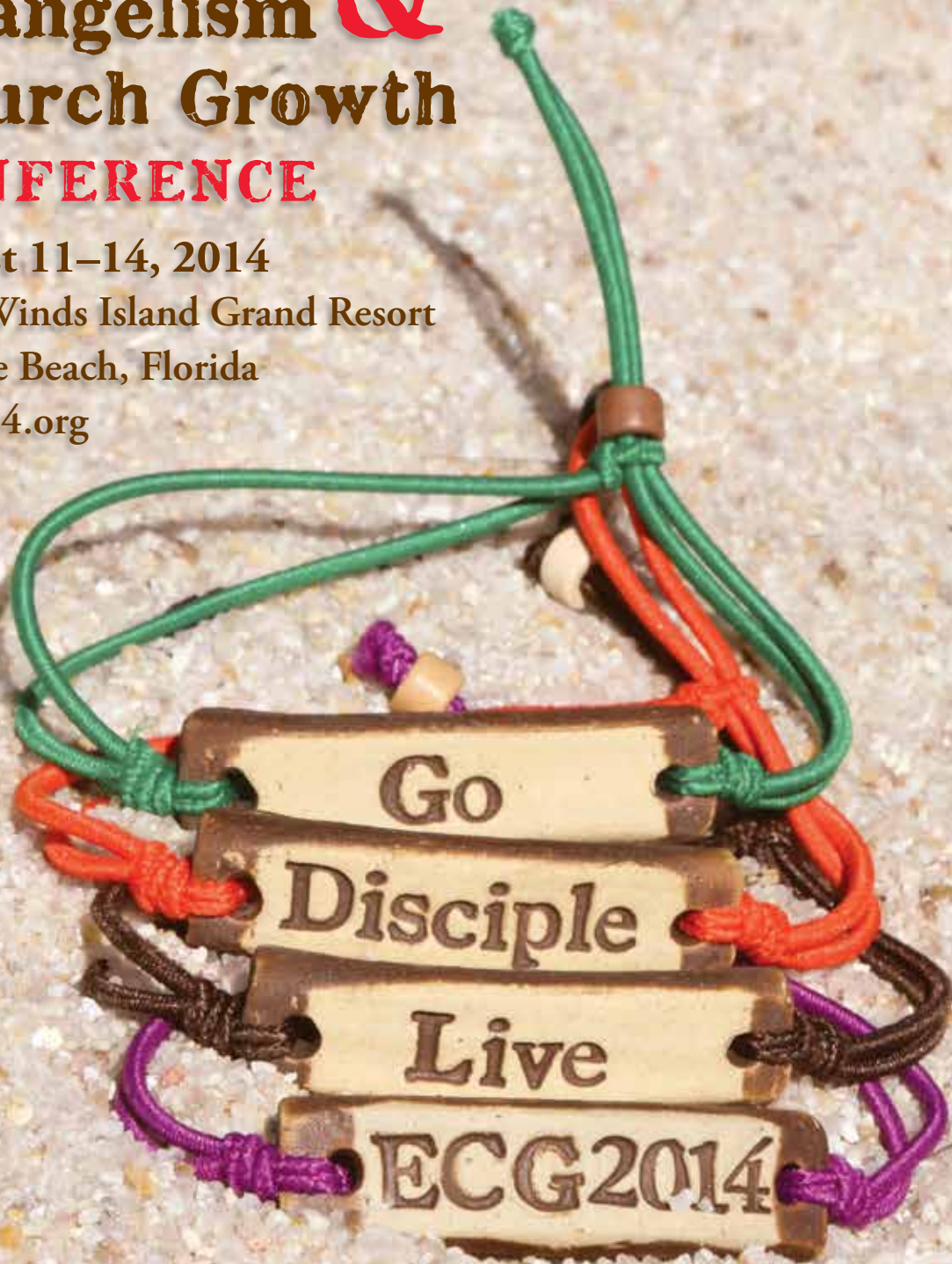

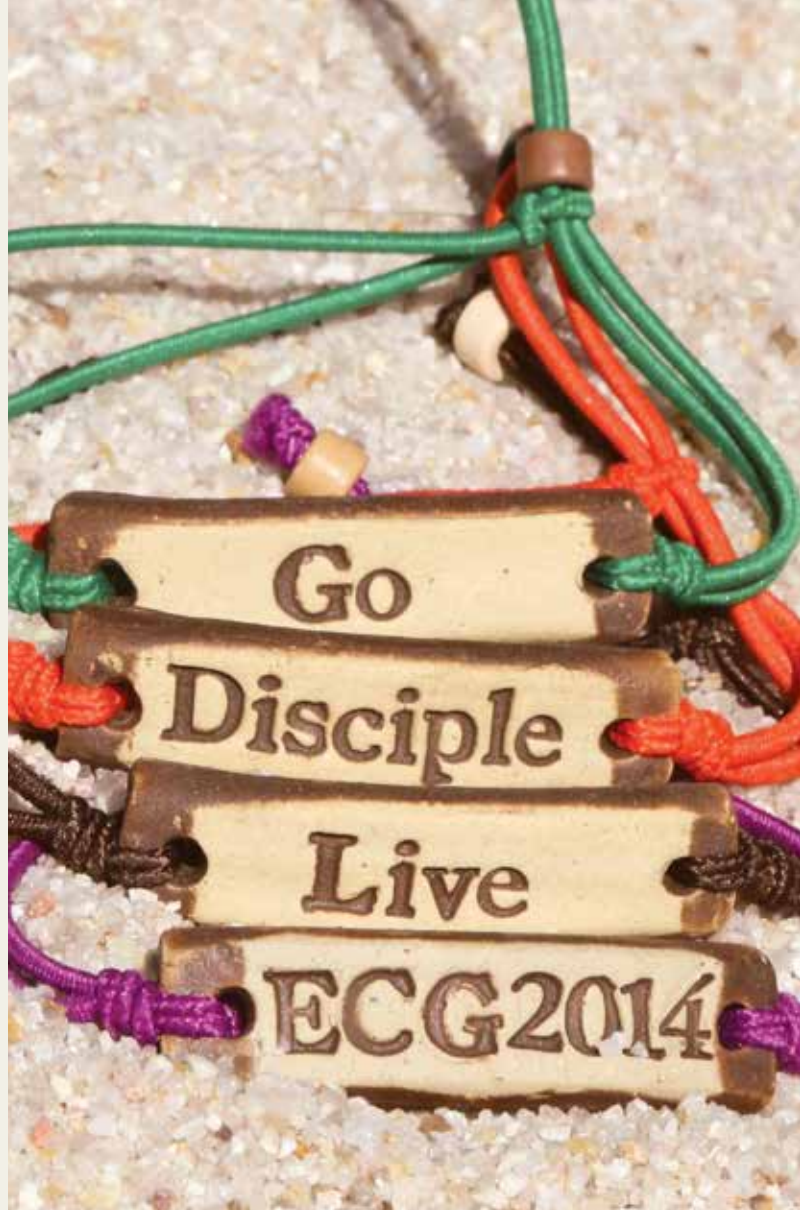

CONFERENCE OVERVIEW

The 2014 Evangelism and Church Growth Conference will be held at the TradeWinds Island Grand resort, 5500 Gulf Boulevard, St. Pete Beach, Florida (tradewindsresort.com).

There are nine tracks offered: Evangelism, 1001 New Worshiping Communities, Congregational Transformation, African American, Hispanic, Brazilian, Korean, Multicultural, and Interfaith Evangelism. All groups will share plenary and worship services, as well as group meals.

The following information will assist you in selecting and registering for a track.

Evangelism Track

Participants in the Evangelism track will attend presentations on topics that include “Knowing and Following Jesus,” “Personal Transformation,” “The Value of Community,” and “Joining Jesus in Mission.” Johannes G. J. “Jannie” Swart will be the primary leader and will provide suggestions on how to incorporate these tools into your life. Workshops will be offered on the last day. See page 5 for more details.

1001 New Worshiping Communities Track

The 1001 New Worshiping Communities track will allow participants to explore various aspects of starting a new worshiping community. Through a keynote address, workshops, small groups, “fishbowl conversations,” and more, participants will discuss and learn about leadership, finances, theological grounding for starting NWCs, and more. See page 6 for more details.

Congregational Transformation Track

“Going to the Well: Renewal and Resourcing for Congregational Transformation” is the theme for this track. The Congregational Transformation Track is designed for congregational and presbytery leaders—people working to enhance the vitality and ministry capacity of congregations—or those supporting them. This track acknowledges a key challenge: There is so much to do just to keep things going, much less work on any kind of transformation. Need inspiration? Hope? Tools? New ideas? Participants will find those resources as they study, play, pray, and grow together. Participants in this track will select one of four “streams” to follow during the conference. See page 7 for more details.

African American Track

“Compassionate Prophetic Discipleship With and Among African Americans” will be the theme of this track. Participants will use Acts 1:8 and Luke 4:18–19 to examine opportunities for African American leaders, congregations, and communities to develop systems that will enable congregations to relate evangelism and social justice to more faithfully make compassionate, prophetic disciples. The leader of this track, Lonnie Oliver, is the associate for African American congregational support in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). See page 8 for more details.

Hispanic Track (Language Specific)

This track will address issues such as strategies for outreach and evangelism, plus ministry geared to youth and young adults. The leader for the track will be Héctor Rodríguez, associate for Hispanic/Latino/na congregational support in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). See page 9 for more details.

Brazilian Track (Language Specific)

This track will focus on three topics: key strategies for starting new communities, how to strengthen immigrant ministry, and seeking local leaders. The leader for the track will be Almir Dantas Dias, field staff for Portuguese-language ministry in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). See page 9 for more details.

Korean Track (Language Specific)

The leader of this track, Sun Bai Kim, is the associate for Korean congregational support in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). See page 9 for more details.

Multicultural Track

The Multicultural track will emphasize Scripture as the basis for multicultural ministries, incorporating the Great Commission for developing transformational leaders in existing and new worshiping communities. Participants will learn to implement Scripture-based strategies for evangelizing and for engaging communities. Utilizing a holistic approach to mission in a changing landscape, participants will be exposed to both church resources and secular resources, including cutting-edge media. The leader for this track, Raafat Girgis, is the associate for multicultural/congregational support for the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Mission Agency. See page 9 for more details.

Interfaith Evangelism Track

“Faithful Discipleship in an Interreligious World” will be the theme for the Interfaith Evangelism track. Participants will explore questions such as: Do interreligious relationships help or harm faithful discipleship? How should Christians engage people with different religious commitments in the midst of Christ’s call to witness and evangelism? This track also will explore what it means for Christians to engage in interreligious relationships in their families, neighborhoods, and the world. Participants will learn about programs offered by the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Office of Interfaith Relations that help nurture transformative discipleship encompassing dynamic interreligious relationships. The leader, Christine J. Hong, is the associate for theology: interfaith relations in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). See page 9 for more details.

PLENARY SPEAKERS

Johannes G. J. “Jannie” Swart will be the plenary speaker on Monday, August 11. He will also be the primary leader for the Evangelism track.

Swart is the associate professor of world mission and evangelism at Pittsburgh Theological Seminary. With a background that includes international mission experience, new church development, and pastoral leadership in large and small churches, he offers a unique ability to help students and congregations think theologically about ministry in the 21st century.

He previously served as senior pastor of Fontainebleau Community Church in Johannesburg, South Africa. There he led a Dutch Reformed mega-church during the congregation’s post-apartheid attempt to become more multicultural, multiracial, and multilingual. Before that, Swart led a new church development geared to college students in Cape Town, South Africa, while serving at Tafelberg Dutch Reformed Church in Cape Town.

Juan Martínez will be the plenary speaker on Wednesday, August 13. He also will be co-leader of a “stream” in the Congregational Transformation track.

Martínez is vice provost and professor of Hispanic studies and pastoral leadership at Fuller Theological Seminary. He has also served as associate provost for diversity and international programs and as director of the seminary’s Center for the Study of Hispanic Church and Community. Among other topics, his current research focuses on the history of Latino Protestantism, Latino Protestant identity, ministry in Latino Protestant churches, Latino and Latin American Anabaptists, and transnational mission among U.S. Latinos.

Most recently Martínez has published the books *Churches, Cultures & Leadership* (with Mark Lau Branson, 2011), *Los Protestantes: An Introduction to Latino Protestantism in the United States* (2011), *Los Evangélicos: Portraits of Latino Protestantism in the United States* (coedited with Lindy Scott, 2009), *Walk with the People: Latino Ministry in the United States/Caminando entre el pueblo: Ministerio latino en los Estados Unidos* (2008), and *Vivir y servir en el exilio: Lecturas teológicas de la experiencia latina en los Estados Unidos* (coedited with Jorge Maldonado, 2008).

WORSHIP LEADER

Marcia McFee, the conference worship leader, is an author, worship designer and leader, professor, preacher, and artist. She combines her experience in professional companies of music, theater, and dance with a variety of worship and preaching styles to bring a fresh experience of the gospel to each worship setting.

Her approach to helping the church worship God fully includes a focus on the education of local congregations. She travels extensively in order to teach regional workshops for congregational leaders and worship teams. She also specializes in designing and leading conference worship.

McFee received a master’s of theological studies degree at Saint Paul School of Theology with a concentration in preaching and worship. She recently received the alumni association’s Outstanding Graduate Award. She also earned a PhD in liturgical studies at the Graduate Theological Union. She has been a guest lecturer and adjunct faculty member at 12 seminaries. An avid skier, she is the co-author of *Spiritual Adventures in the Snow: Skiing & Snowboarding as Renewal for Your Soul*.

In addition to serving as the conference worship leader, she is leading a stream in the Congregational Transformation track.

Select one of the following workshops:

Becoming More Like Jesus...from the Inside Out! (EV1)

As children, many people were encouraged to be nice like Jesus, to be kind and to share. As adults, however, they discover that they cannot do this through sheer willpower. They can do this only by putting themselves on God’s path and practicing the same things Jesus did to stay connected with God—prayer, study, meditation, solitude, silence, worship, and more. Participants will explore the time-honored spiritual disciplines as practiced by Christ.

Leader: Ann Hilborn has a master of religious education degree and is certified as an educator in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). She completed her MDiv at Fuller Theological Seminary prior to earning a doctor of ministry degree in Christian spirituality and leadership.

Creating a Culture of Spiritual Formation/ Discipleship in Your Presbytery (EV2)

Participants are invited to imagine a presbytery meeting that renews their souls, a presbytery in which pastors pray for and encourage one another across theological and ideological lines, a presbytery that offers governance and mutual disciplining relationships. This workshop will focus on collegial discussion and sharing of ideas, practices, and dreams for presbyteries, and reflection together on where participants might go from there.

Leader: George Goodrich is co-general presbyter for Yellowstone Presbytery.

Krispy Kreme/White Castle/Brisket/Bud Light: Doing Evangelism in a Culturally Diverse Context (EV3)

Participants will explore the principles and perceptions of transformation by looking through the lens of geographical, cultural, and generational norms. Participants will work through concepts identified in the Engage curriculum, beginning with reclaiming their own stories of transformation and the story of God’s redemptive mission found in Scripture. Participants will be asked to honestly describe expectations of church and ministry needs as defined in their local context and to gather ideas and innovations from other workshop participants who might have a good idea that will work “back home.”

Leader: Jerry Cannon is pastor of C. N. Jenkins Memorial Presbyterian Church in Charlotte, North Carolina. He is also a member of the field staff for the Office of Evangelism in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.).

A 21st Century Model for Using Story to Share the Gospel: Sharing a Real Word in a Virtual World (EV4)

Ministers and evangelists have to share the gospel in an age in which those they intend to share with are viewers. In this workshop participants will study story structure and will explore ways to share the gospel via creative multimedia approaches that will serve the future of the church.

Leader: Ralph Basui Watkins is associate professor of evangelism and church growth at Columbia Theological Seminary.

Engage Holistic Evangelism (EV5)

Participants will explore three basic components of holistic evangelism: (1) their own stories of transformation; (2) their spheres of influence and what it means to be a disciple-making church; and (3) the biblical connection between evangelism and justice. The workshop also will help participants discern how to bear witness to and reach people in a changing cultural context. Participants will have an opportunity to look at the new evangelism curricula, Engage: Gospel, Engage: Discipleship, and Engage: Mission.

Leaders: Ray Jones is the coordinator for evangelism in the Mission Agency of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.). Dave Loleng is the associate for evangelism in the Mission Agency.

1001 NEW WORSHIPPING COMMUNITIES TRACK Tuesday, August 12

10:30 a.m.: “What Is the 1001 New Worshiping Communities Movement All About and Why Does It Matter?”

This is an opportunity to review the definition of a new worshiping community and to learn about the resources available to presbyteries, congregations, and community leaders. The second part of the session will be spent in small group discussions.

Spiritual Warfare (NW1)

Starting a new worshiping community is challenging work. Even if one has the Herculean resolve necessary to achieve success, hindrances and obstacles abound. Often leaders underestimate the spiritual opposition that they will face. Paul warned us in Ephesians that we wrestle against principalities, powers, and spiritual evil. Thankfully, through Christ, we have the victory. Explore what spiritual warfare looks like within a NWC context

and discover tools/strategies to help empower leaders to overcome spiritual battles.

Leaders: Aaron Howard is the pastor of As One Fellowship, a multicultural new worshiping community in Nashville, and a fourth-year PhD student in religion at Vanderbilt University. Edwin Andrade is co-pastor of Riverside Presbyterian Church in Sterling, Virginia.

Think Tank (NW2)

Do you have an idea for a new worshiping community? Has God been nudging you to get in the game? This is an opportunity to present your vision to a group of experienced leaders and to receive thoughtful, honest feedback. Each participant should prepare a five-minute “elevator speech” summarizing his or her vision. This workshop is limited to 10 participants.

Leader: Vera White is the associate for the 1001 New Worshiping Communities program of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Mission Agency.

Discerning a Call (NW3)

Starting a new worshiping community is a delicate process. Participants in this workshop will investigate potential frames for this journey, whether or not they are ordained. From prescreening tools, to assessment centers, to personal and communal tools for local reflection, participants will explore practical resources for doing the work that is increasingly necessary prior to gathering a new worshiping community.

Leader: Nick Warnes is the organizing pastor of Northland Village Church in Los Angeles. He recently completed his first book, *Starting Missional Churches: Life with God in the Neighborhood*, set for release through InterVarsity Press in September.

Discipleship Is Mission/Mission Is Discipleship (NW4)

Leading others into further discipleship doesn't happen in a classroom. It's letting others see you living out your life in Christ while being part of the community around you. Participants will explore what it means to live out God's grace in the world.

Leaders: Sean Chow is an associate pastor at St. Paul's Presbyterian Church in Laurel Springs, New Jersey. He has started several small worshiping communities, including The Well (wellnewthing.com), a new worshiping

community sponsored by St. Paul's. Nancy Graham Ogne is the organizing pastor for Hope Presbyterian Church at Lake Nona, in Orlando, Florida. She also served for 12 years as associate pastor at Community Presbyterian Church in Celebration, Florida.

Come Away and Rest Awhile (NW5)

In the midst of a demanding and stressful time, Jesus invited his first disciples to “come away and rest awhile” (Mark 6:31). Leading a new worshiping community demands time, energy, emotional stamina, and spiritual investment. Participants in this workshop will explore best practices for NWC leaders and those close to them, in regard to spiritual and physical health.

Leaders: Mike Gehrling is co-pastor of the Upper Room, a new worshiping community in Pittsburgh. Camie Minter is director of children's ministry at LiveOak Presbyterian Church in Cedar Park, Texas.

Beyond Start-Ups (NW6)

The often-neglected side of pioneering a new community involves moving it toward sustainability over the long haul. Participants will look at elements essential to missional community health and viability. The workshop will also offer practical tools to help new worshiping communities discern their own progress toward goals appropriate to their situation and context.

Leader: Dan Steigerwald served 20 years in Europe and in various developing world contexts as a missionary, church planter, and pastor. He is an active leader in Christian Associates International and leads coaching teams with Bridges and George Fox Evangelical Seminary.

Developing Leaders as Disciples (NW7)

Leaders in new worshiping communities are examples of discipleship to the community at large. Our primary calling is to a personal relationship with Jesus—the person, the incarnate God. Participants will explore how leadership development is rooted in authentic and vulnerable discipleship. Ideas and resources for developing disciples who are leaders will be shared.

Leaders: Chris Brown is a founding co-pastor of the Upper Room in Pittsburgh. Nancy Wind is the coordinator of Isaiah's Table: Grace, Hope, Food for All, a new worshiping community in Syracuse, New York.

Getting Started and Keeping It Going (NW8)

Whether you are ready to go, on the ground, or months into the process, this three-part workshop is a journey to start something new. Participants will talk through the big picture and share practical realities of creating a new worshiping community. Discussion topics include: How should I be spending my time? When should I start worship? How do I involve others in my dream for this new community? How can my support team really support me?

Leaders: Shannon Kiser is a member of the field staff for the Office of Church Growth in the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) Mission Agency. Keith Gunter is in the midst of planting New Creation Church, a highly relational church in Hendersonville, Tennessee. New Creation started out in his living room and has grown to a local storefront with a mission to walk with others.

Leadership (TR1)

What are the qualities of a transformational leader? What skills and resources are helpful in navigating the waters of change while a congregation is undergoing transformation? This stream will focus on fostering compassionate hearts to empower transformation and to find ways through resistance, making space for the Spirit to work.

Leader: Laurie Ferguson is a Presbyterian minister, licensed clinical psychologist, and a coach credentialed by the International Coaching Federation as a professional certified coach. As the senior research fellow for coaching and director of the Residential Coaching Program at Auburn Theological Seminary, she has coached church leaders and supervised coaches since 2005.

Worship (TR2)

At the heart of Christian experience is worship. Worship itself is transformational, both in its preparation and in practice. Participants will explore the power of thoughtful, theologically based, and biblically based worship that encourages and shapes the transformational journey God is calling us to.

Leader: Marcia McFee is an author, worship designer and leader, professor, preacher, and artist. She combines her experience in professional companies of music, theater, and dance with a variety of worship and preaching styles in order to bring a fresh experience of the gospel to each worship setting.

Community (TR3)

Much of God's transformational work—growth in discipleship, character, ministry gifts and skills—takes place in community. Jesus' focus on the kingdom of God describes a community with practices and lifestyles that bless members, extend love to enemies, and welcome strangers. The work of transforming the community's neighborhoods is accomplished through intentional life together. This stream will explore the development of communal practices of mutual forbearance and forgiveness, along with identifying and supporting discipleship and new leadership and ministry gifts, with a view to engaging the local neighborhood.

Leaders: Deborah Fae Swift has been involved in urban ministry in Rochester, New York, since 1990. She is the

pastor/teaching elder of South Presbyterian Church in Rochester. William H. Wilkinson is the pastor/teaching elder of Trinity Emmanuel Presbyterian Church in Rochester. He also serves as vice president for social issues of the Greater Rochester Community of Churches and is a board member of the National Black Presbyterian Caucus.

Transformation in Spanish Congregations (TR4)

What does it take to shape a transformation process for a Hispanic congregation? In order to take seriously the differences in cultures and practices, this stream will focus on transforming the leadership, the worship, and the community practices of a Spanish-speaking congregation.

Leaders: Juan Martínez is vice provost and professor of Hispanic studies and pastoral leadership at Fuller Theological Seminary. Daniel Beteta is the founding pastor of the Mid-Peninsula Hispanic Outreach Ministry/Latinos Unidos en Cristo church in San Francisco.
