Haiti became an independent country in the early 19th century when a slave revolt overthrew the French colonial government. It has had a turbulent history marked by military dictatorships, corruption, and violence. In 2010 a massive earthquake struck the capital city of Port au Prince and the surrounding area, dealing a devastating blow to what was already one of the most impoverished countries in the Western Hemisphere. The Haitian government estimates that the quake killed 316,000 people and destroyed 250,000 residences and 30,000 commercial buildings. The Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) through its disaster assistance ministry arrived quickly to assist with recovery efforts and continues to help the country rebuild alongside our partner church, the Episcopal Diocese of Haiti, and other partner organizations. The PC(USA) has been involved in Haiti for many years, working with partners in health, hunger, and education ministries.

Support your mission co-workers in Haiti

Presbyterian World Mission's focus in Haiti is to address the root causes of poverty, which is one of the critical global issues that we are pursuing with partners around the globe. Our commitment to a holistic witness includes two other critical global initiatives—sharing the good news of God's love in Jesus Christ and engaging in ministries of reconciliation. Working through our longstanding partnerships in Haiti, Presbyterian World Mission is able to address poverty in ways not available to many other organizations that serve in Haiti. For example, the earthquake in 2010 sent people fleeing the capital city to live with relatives in rural areas, including the town of Papay where mission co-worker Mark Hare, an agricultural technician, serves with the Mouvman Peyizan Papay (MPP), which in English means Farmers Movement of Papay. Thanks to MPP, the community had grown enough food to nourish the burgeoning population. Through MPP, Presbyterians have helped fund an innovative project to help earthquake survivors build "eco-villages." Those displaced by the earthquake are being given resources to build a home and taught to farm so they might feed their families and earn a living. These are just some of the many ways that US Presbyterians and their partners are making a difference in Haiti.
